We have several partners that have been working with us to support veterans for many years. In 2022, our BCIT Military Skills Conversion Program sponsorship entered it's 12th year, our partnership supporting service dogs entered it's 9th year, and our work with the Veterans Transition Network entered it's 13th year. We look forward to many years of working alongside organizations that support the many needs of veterans in BC and the Yukon. We also look forward to working alongside new partners as we launch new programs in 2023.

The Legion Foundation would not be able to do the work we do without the unwavering support of Legion Branches, Ladies Auxiliaries and individual donors. **How We Do This:** By supporting and delivering programs that focus on mental health, medical supports, research and those who are homeless or under-housed.

The Legion is known for caring for veterans and the Legion Foundation was proud to support several veteran-serving organizations in 2022.

In total, we provided over \$260,000 in mental health supports, including veteran-specialized small-group counselling and PTSD service dogs.

In partnership with the BCIT Military Skills Conversion Program, several veterans were supported in achieving post-secondary credit for skills gained while in the military.

We were pleased to reach our funding goal of \$250,000 for the Lokomat gait training machine at Legion Veterans Village. This specialized equipment is in high-demand, helping injured veterans learn to walk again.

## **RHEAL'S STORY**



Rheal is a shy person but with the help of Lucy, his service dog, you would never know it.

"Lucy has given me more confidence".

Rheal and Lucy are the 100th team to graduate from the OSI-PTSD program offered through VICD Service Dogs, a partner of the Legion Foundation. These "dogs with jobs" work as teams to learn to be emotionally tuned to their person and their unique triggers. For people like Rheal, who served in Afghanistan, this can be a lifeline to the world.

"Being in public is still a work in progress, but having a Service Dog makes it so that my focus is on the team aspect of our relationship rather than what's happening around me or in my head. Lucy helps reduce my stress."

Through our annual grant process, the Foundation awarded over \$18,000 to 13 different charities in BC. One such charity was the Garden of Gratitude project at the Columbia View Lodge run by KBHR Health Foundation.

Columbia View Lodge is a long-term care facility providing full-time care for 76 residents in Trail, BC. The gardens at Columbia View Lodge are used for outdoor recreational activities for large or small groups, as well as provide private space for families to interact. Phase 1 of the project will widen and level the concrete pathways, create a larger gathering area, install much-needed sunshades, and add raised and mobile garden beds.

We are excited to see the positive impact this space will have on the health and wellbeing of residents, families and employees!

### **RYAN'S STORY**



One of the people helped through small-group, peer-supported counselling is Ryan. While serving with the RCMP, Ryan realized that anger had become the main emotion he used to express himself.

"When you go to a regimentedstyle military training, you learn that no matter what, you're going to push through and you're going to be successful. You try to apply that to everything in life. But with something like this, you can't just push through."

In late 2021, Ryan was connected with Veterans Transition Network, a partner of the Legion Foundation. With the support of his wife and young daughter, he attended a 5-day retreat-style session. During that time, Ryan learned tools to help navigate his emotions and traumas and how to redirect his mind. Ryan was able to return to his family and career, better equipped.

In 2023, the Legion Foundation will launch a new program called "Leave the Streets Behind" that aims to support veterans experiencing homelessness or near homelessness. Based on the program run by the Ontario Command for over 13 years, we will start by providing Comfort Bags and Apartment Kits to veterans in need. Our plan is to work with community partners and local Legion branches to distribute 50 Comfort Bags and 25 Apartment Kits during our first year of operations. Ultimately, our goal is to connect with veterans to ensure they have the support they need until they are ready to "Leave the Streets Behind".
